

West Virginia University College of Law seeks candidates for the Archibald McDougall Visiting Professorship in International Law. The selected candidate will spend two to five weeks in residence at the West Virginia College of Law in Morgantown, West Virginia during the Fall 2024 or Spring 2025 academic term. The selected Visiting Professor is expected to teach one course to law students during the residency on a topic related to international or comparative law.

The Archibald McDougall Visiting Professorship is intended to provide students with an opportunity to discuss cutting-edge global issues with an experienced international or comparative law scholar. Consequently, the McDougall Selection Committee seeks a candidate who will bring an internationally informed perspective to the classroom. In addition, there is a preference for a candidate who can demonstrate either excellence in teaching international law or a sustained engagement in an area of international law. Applicants should possess a Ph.D. or other terminal degree (such as a J.D. or J.D. equivalent). Classroom instruction is English. English language competency and oral English language presentation skills are required.

The West Virginia University College of Law will provide \$10,000 to the selected Archibald McDougall Visiting Professor. The College of Law will also reimburse the selected candidate for the reasonable cost of roundtrip airfare to the College of Law from the Visiting Professor's country of residence or home teaching institution.

West Virginia University is located in Morgantown, a dynamic and diverse community surrounded by the beauty of the Appalachian Mountains. Morgantown is consistently ranked one of the top small cities in the United States. The city's proximity to Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania (75 miles) and Washington, DC (210 miles) allows faculty and students to enjoy the convenience of a small city with the cultural opportunities of a larger metropolitan area. As a university town, Morgantown also boasts its own vibrant cultural scene, with local and touring musical and theatrical productions, local festivals, nearby cultural and historical destinations, and college sporting events.

Interested applicants should submit a copy of their C.V. as well as a statement of interest. The statement of interest should note the applicant's preferred period of residency as the McDougall Visiting Professor, the applicant's area of international law expertise, and any academic courses that the candidate would be interested and capable of teaching during the residency.
